## **February 2014 Belt Buckle Demonstration Demonstrator Chip Brown**



This month's demo was straight from the mind of Chip Brown, custom leatherworking and blacksmithing enthusiast. He demonstrated to us all, how to make a Viking era belt buckle.

He was very informative, and the demo was short and sweet!

### **Materials:**

3/16" x 1" Flat stock

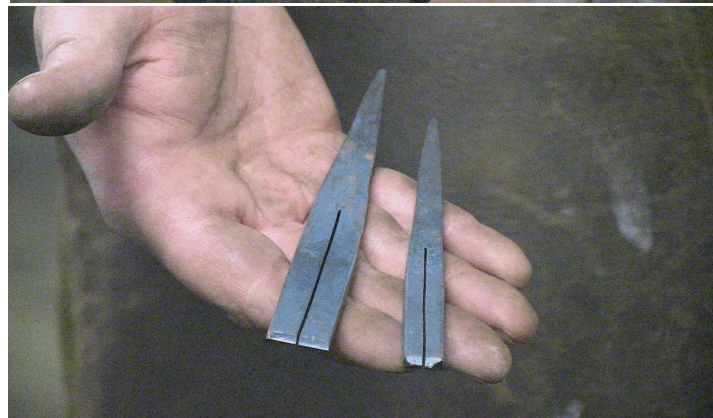
### **Tools:**

Chisel, hammer, and scrolling tongs

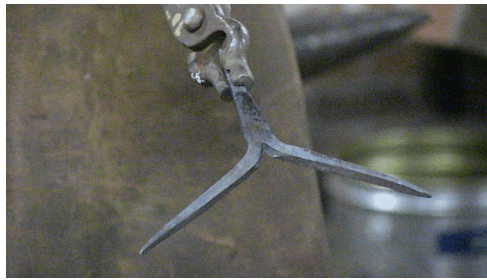
1. He started out by drawing out a very simple taper.

2. Then he cut off the piece from the parent stock. In the photo, he shows two different sizes that he has made.

You will also notice that he used a band saw to cut them for about 2".







3. Next, he spread and tapered the split end to look like this.



4. Then he rounded them up like so.



5. The next part got a little tricky... he needed to make sure that he tapered them enough so they would be equal when he scrolls them inward.



6. As you can see, he did a good job. They should look like this.



7. The final step was to bend the scrolls back into a graceful hook. He gave the whole buckle a slight bend and bent a small prong on the tapered end.



8. And now he can hold up his drawers! Thanks, Chip, for a great demo!

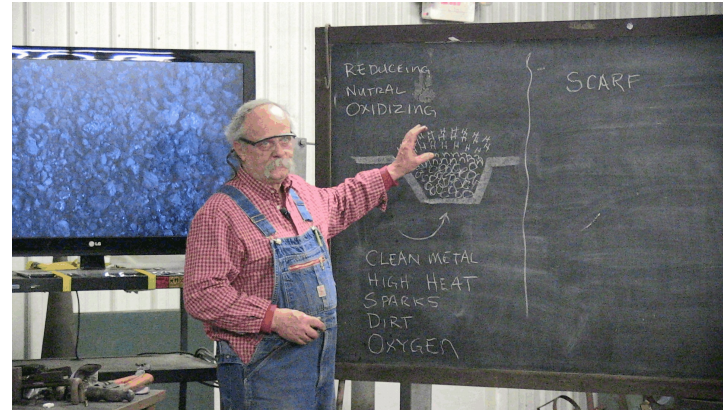
## March 2014 Forge Welding Demonstration Demonstrator Steve Roth



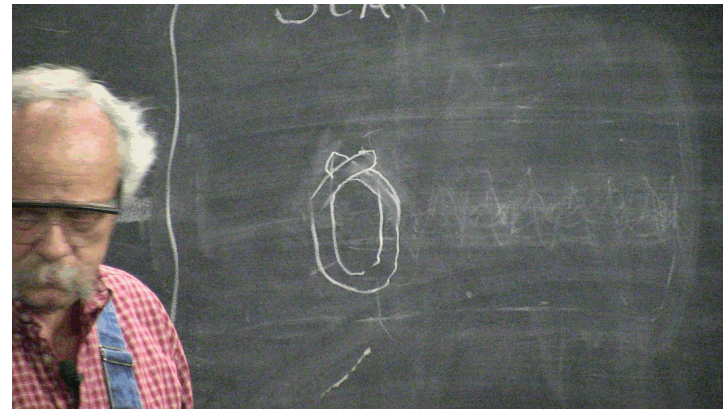
1. This month's demonstrator was our very own Steve Roth. The knowledge this man has about forge welding and forging in general is absolutely amazing. During his demo, he exhibited various forge welds including some really tough ones.

### Materials:

Flux  
Metal  
Lots of coke (pre-burnt coal)

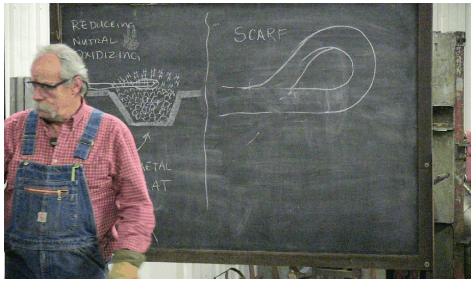


2. In the second photo, Steve was explaining the elements of a good welding fire for a coal forge.



3. The first weld he tackled, with ease might I add, was the link weld. On the board behind him, he was showing the way the ends of the link would come together in order to be welded and have enough material extra.





4. The next weld he moved onto was the simple, but elegant, loop weld, as shown on the chalk board behind him.



5. In this photo, he is doing another type of weld called drop the tongs for a really neat fire poker.



6. Next he was cleaning up the joint.



7. Final shaping!



8. A few minor adjustments...



9. And this is what a master blacksmith looks like! OH YEAH!!! Thanks, Steve, for a great demo...

## April 2014 Rasp Asp Demonstration Demonstrator Roy Adams



This month's demo was an in-depth look at how to make a file become a snake!

### Materials:

- (1) 14" Ferrier's rasp (used is fine)
- (1) 3/8" x 16" piece of mild steel rod

### Tools Needed:

- (1) 1" bottom swage
- (1) 3/16" eyeball punch
- (1) round center punch
- (1) slit chisel



1. You start by rolling up the edges of the rasp using your swage block, being careful not to hammer too hard (that would destroy the scales). You continue doing this for the whole length of the rasp until you get to where the jaws are supposed to be. It should look like a "u".

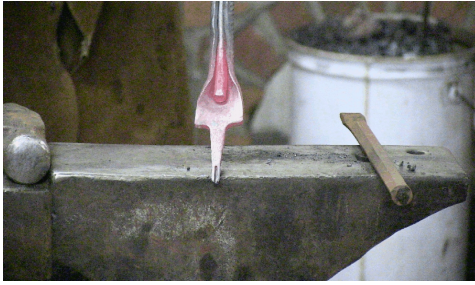


2. At this point, it is a good idea to straighten any bending with a rawhide mallet. Also, it is easy to correct any twisting by any misplaced hammer blows. Make sure to keep it clean with a wire brush as you forge.

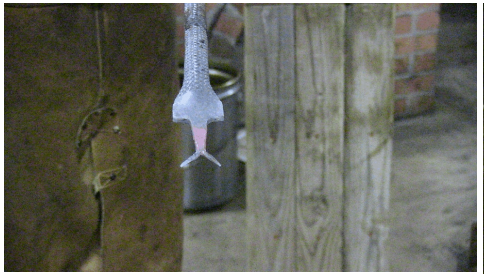




3. Now for the 3/8" bar... put the 3/8" bar in the "u" shape, and close up the tail. Work your way back up to the head of the snake.



4. Make sure when you put in the bar, it does not come up completely to the tang. Leave this area open for the tongue. At this point, you can start to split the tongue, as pictured.



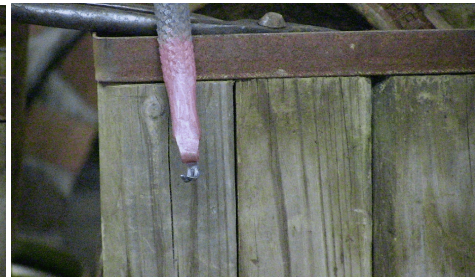
5. After the tongue is split, it should look something like this.



6. Now bend the tongue back into the jaw area, and close up the head and jaw area.



7. It should look something like this. Make sure to bend your tongue so it is not in the hottest part of the fire for your next heat.



8. Now finish shaping the head by hammering behind the jaws on the far side of the anvil, then putting a light taper to the nose also using the far side of the anvil.



9. Now to the vise! This is a tool Roy uses to aide in punching the eyes and nostrils into the snake. It is called a "v block"- simply put, a triangle piece welded to a scrap piece of angle iron.



10. The finished head should look like this. Use your eyeball punch first, then your center punch for the nostrils and a small slot punch for the pupils. Next spread the tongue.



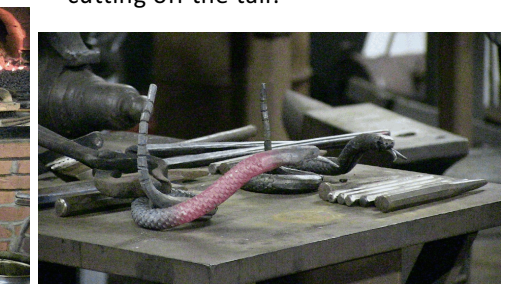
11. Good news- you're almost finished! Flip the snake around and draw out the tail. (Tail has to be welded first).



12. Optional step- use hot cut/ hardie tool to fuller small grooves/rings around the snakes tail, if you want a rattlesnake. Beware of cutting off the tail!



13. Now just bend her up, using whatever is handy. Roy likes a good bending fork, but you can use the horn of the anvil, and a rawhide mallet instead.



14. Voila! Finished product! Good luck :)
